Dear Members,

It is our pleasure to invite you to the 80th Annual Meeting of High West Energy, Inc. on Thursday, June 22, 2017, at our headquarters in Pine Bluffs, Wyoming (6270 County Road 212). The annual meeting is a time for members to celebrate the cooperative way of doing business, enjoy good food, entertainment, and conduct the important business of the Cooperative.

We are blessed to live and work in exciting times. New developments are rapidly changing the electric industry, and when great employees and great technology meet, incredible things become possible. Moving forward, innovative implementation of these technologies will continue to shift the

way your cooperative does business, allowing us to work smarter and offer more to our members, all while reducing long-term operational costs.

In 2016, we invested almost \$5,000,000 in the Co-op's distribution system to keep pace and prepare for anticipated future electric demand. Teams across HWE's four operating districts constructed or rebuilt almost 56 miles of line (out of 3,679). Additionally, we replaced another 750 poles (we own approximately 75,000) and performed preventative maintenance on our line devices (breakers, regulators, reclosers, etc.). These efforts will result in better power reliability and reduce weather-related outages.

In addition to making system improvements, your cooperative was extremely involved and committed to the communities we serve by donating our time, talents, and monetary contributions in a wide variety of areas. As you will see in the following pages, the investments we made were not just centered around poles and wires. Just

like you, our Co-op employees live, work, and play in these communities. This makes you our neighbors and friends, not just a customer in a distant city. We take great pride in that fact and work even harder to ensure High West Energy remains a community oriented business.

We had a great number of other accomplishments throughout the year. We concluded the year financially strong with operating revenues of \$44,617,187, and met our equity management goals. Our net margins, which includes a profit generated by our subsidiary (dba High West Wiring and High West Digital Solutions), was \$2,970,405.

You will see throughout this report that each and every one of us at HWE has a role in serving you. Thank you for your membership in our Cooperative. We look forward to another year of fulfilling our mission to provide our member-owners safe, reliable and competitively priced energy and services that meet the needs of the membership.



2016 Annual Meeting Minutes

High West Energy, Inc.
Kimball, Nebraska | November 5, 2016

The 79th Annual Meeting of the members of High West Energy, Inc., was held at Kimball High School in Kimball, NE at 1:00 p.m., Saturday, November 5, 2016. Following registration, lunch and a craft show, the meeting was called to order by President Ed Prosser. President Prosser welcomed everyone in attendance and recognized current and retired board members, employees, veterans and invited speakers.

The invocation was given by Dave Crouse, CIO of High West Energy.

The reading of the 2016 Notice of Annual Meeting was given by Ron Lopez, Attorney at Law and General Counsel for High West Energy, Inc., whose firm has represented the cooperative for 38 years. It was determined that a quorum was present and that the business of the meeting could move forward. It was moved, seconded and unanimously approved to dispense with the reading of the 2015 annual meeting minutes.

ELECTIONS

Ron Lopez presided over the election. The business of the meeting was to take action upon the following matters:

- A. The Nominating Committee submitted the name of Jerry Burnett from District 14, Jamie Fowler from District 16, and Kevin Thomas from District 17 as nominees for three-year terms.
- B. Bylaw review and changes supported by the Board of Directors were presented for a vote.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Prosser recognized and congratulated Director Gary Smith for earning his Credentialed Cooperative Director (CCD) certification from the

NRECA, and Director Jamie Fowler for earning the Director Gold Credential.

President Prosser thanked members for giving High West Energy high scores for customer satisfaction and noted that our Co-op has the third lowest rates when compared to their neighbors. He addressed challenges for the Co-op including reliability, line maintenance and equitable rates. He reported the broadband internet study and analysis will continue with a decision expected next year to either move ahead with the initiative or not. President Prosser assured the group the Co-op model continues to work and High West Energy will adapt and continue to provide safe, reliable service at a competitive price.

CEO'S REPORT

CEO/General Manager Brian Heithoff recognized and thanked the Board of Directors and employees. He reported on numbers for the 2015/2016 fiscal year and discussed the upcoming rate increase. CEO/General Manager Brian Heithoff gave a patronage allocation and dividends update. He also reported on 154 new electric services, over 20 miles of energized line added, 50 miles of rebuilt lines, 760 poles replaced, service reliability, doubling our system maintenance, smart metering and smart monitoring. He discussed member survey results and the new services we offer; Renewablends, electric water heaters and the Watt-er Wise program. Also discussed were off-peak heating rates, energy consumption, whole house surge protection and security lights. He also noted last year was noteworthy for safety and lower outage times.

CEO/General Manager Brian Heithoff discussed the High West Digital Solutions (HWDS) division and the services they offer. He also discussed the High West

Wiring (HWW) division and their recent successes and growth.

YOUTH TOURS

Anna Larson of Cheyenne spoke about the Youth Tour she attended in Washington, D.C. She thanked the board and members for sending her on this amazing trip.

GUEST SPEAKERS

Ken Reif, Tri-State G&T senior vice president and general council reviewed Tri-State's background, the area and states they serve and the responsibility of their board. He announced Tri-State is working to keep prices low and thanked Director Jerry Burnett for his participation and representation on the Tri-State Board. He discussed meeting the members needs and the coal factor in generation. He reported on regulations on current power plants and the government's underwriting of wind and solar. He announced Tri-State works for continuity and innovation on preserving the value of the long term, low cost, coal assets while adding more renewal options or natural gas. He reported 24% of its generating energy comes from renewables and includes the hydro projects from decades ago. He discussed the announcement of closing two coal plants that were no longer economical to run, due to new regulations.

Shawn Taylor, executive director of WREA thanked President Prosser for serving on the statewide board. He went on to discuss "the great, the incredibly frustrating and the beautifully stupid." He explained "the great" is what Co-ops have done for the past 80 years; meetings, youth tours, operation round up, and the cooperative model. "The incredibly frustrating" are the outside influences (the ones that don't live in rural America). Rules and regulations that have an effect

on us. We know what's best for us. "The beautifully stupid part" is traveling on the back roads in WY and NE, when sudden, spring snow storms strand you in very remote areas. He advised the group to "enjoy rural back roads but be smart."

Andy Glover, vice president of Co-Bank presented a letter of congratulations from Co-Bank's CEO celebrating High West Energy's award for the 2016 cooperative partnership of the year with the USDA Rural Development.

ELECTION RESULTS

The election committee counted all ballots for Districts 14, 16, and 17. Ron Lopez announced that Jerry Burnett, Jamie Fowler and Kevin Thomas were re-elected for three-year terms. Ron Lopez announced all bylaw changes presented by the board and voted on by the membership passed with a majority of the vote.

No new business.

NEW BUSINESS & GENERAL DISCUSSION


Ed announced the 2017 meeting will be held on June 22, at High West Energy's headquarters in Pine Bluffs, WY.





Highlights Over the Years



1937

Rural Electric Company was founded on January 27, under the Rural Electrification Act of 1936 signed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The funding channeled through electric cooperatives, most of which still exist today. This act provided electricity to rural farming and ranching communities throughout the United States. The first power lines were energized within the service territory by 1940.



1956

The Co-op experienced significant growth throughout the 1940s-1950s. This picture is a membership certificate from 1956, generously brought in by a member from Albin, WY.



1962

Rural Electric Company chose Potter, Nebraska as its first service center site. The building was purchased from a blacksmith in 1962, and the addition was added in the late 1980s.

The Co-op headquarters moved to its current location in the mid-1980s. R.E.C. later added its second service center on South Greeley Highway in Cheyenne in the 1990s. In 2012, that service center moved to its current location at 3302 I-80 Service Road, near Sapp Brothers.



1999

Rural Electric Company changed its name to High West Energy on June 2. Many Co-ops were recognized as 'Rural Electric Company,' which felt too generic.



2001

The ice storm that hit in April, left members in the Carpenter/Grover area without power for eight days. Over 1,000 poles snapped and left power lines on the ground. With the help of six neighboring Co-ops and two contract crews, power was restored to the area.



2007

High West Energy helped at the Extreme Makeover: Home Edition project, east of Cheyenne. The Co-op continued to experience growth.



2015

High West Energy celebrated its grand re-opening of the new addition to the east side of the building. The Co-op's assets nearly doubled from 2011-2015.



2017

High West Energy plans to celebrate its 80th Birthday on June 22, 2017, with the membership at the High West Energy office in Pine Bluffs. Dinner will be served in conjunction with the annual meeting that evening. Come celebrate 80 years of service!
