## HISTORY OF HIGH WEST ENERGY

Since 1962, Sparks has been keeping members informed of their local cooperative and now, Sparks is coming directly to you! We hope that this change is beneficial and better informs you of what High West Energy is doing and what to look forward to. To start the new year out, let's start with a quick glimpse into how High West Energy came to be.

High West Energy has a long history, and we are proud to continue the growth of the cooperative. High West Energy began as the Rural Electric Company (REC) after community members in southeastern Wyoming, northeastern Colorado, and western Nebraska started discussing central station power and how that would positively impact local farmers. A temporary board was formed in 1936 where George Phillips, a local Pine Bluffs farmer, was appointed as the first manager to promote and organize the memberships. At the time, membership fees were only five dollars!

In 1939, the Rural Electric Company received a loan for 162 miles of line and in May of 1940, the first lines were energized to 500 members and REC had invested \$234,000. Phillips served as manager until 1946 and then B.E. Lyons was selected to oversee operations at REC.

With the growth of the cooperative, military operations were also growing in the area. High West Energy is a proud supporter of the military, and it began in 1962 when a missile program was created, but REC found itself with more load than the lines could carry. REC then formed a building program to ensure the system could provide for 98 missile sites that were being built in its service territory.

Lyons retired in 1976, but during his time, the company grew immensely by expanding the service territory to 2,675 miles of distribution line with 4,900 consumers including 700 irrigation wells.

In July 1999, REC changed its name to High West Energy. Today, we serve 10,727 meters across a 4,228 square mile area in Wyoming, Colorado, and Nebraska. We cover Laramie and Albany counties in Wyoming, Weld and Logan counties in Colorado, and Cheyenne, Kimball, and Banner counties in Nebraska.

As we continue to grow, it is always our mission to serve our members and communities by providing safe, reliable and competitively priced energy and services. We've got you covered from electricity to connectivity by offering energy, wiring and information technology.

From 1936 to 2022, High West Energy continues to be grateful for our members and all that you provide for our communities. Our doors are always open, and we look forward to continuing to serve you!

## **Brown Sugar Ham Steak**

- 1 (8 ounce) bone-in fully cooked ham steak
- 5 tablespoons butter
- 5 tablespoons brown sugar

Cook ham steak in a large skillet over medium heat until browned, 3 to 4 minutes per side. Remove ham from skillet; drain off any fat. Melt butter in the same skillet over medium-low heat. Stir in brown sugar. Return ham to skillet. Cook, turning ham often, until heated through and brown sugar has dissolved, for about 10 minutes. Reduce heat if brown sugar/butter mixture starts to pop or splatter.
